Authority record

Record of the decision of the authoritative form of a:

- Name (Personal & Corporate)
- Name / Title
- Uniform title
- Subject

used as a heading in a bibliographic record.

Purpose of authority records

 Authority control* - Procedures by which consistency of form is maintained in headings (names, uniform titles, series titles, and subjects) in bibliographic records

• Cross-references for

- other forms of name: See reference (4xx)
- equally valid names: See Also reference (5xx)
- **Disambiguate** similar or identical headings
- **Collocate** similar things

Control Headings

- Links headings in bibliographic records to matching authority records
- **Controlled headings** will automatically be updated if the linked authority record changes.
- Controlled heading link opens the authority record in a separate window

When to use Control Headings

- When a heading on a WorldCat record is **not controlled**
- When you add a **new heading** to a **WorldCat record**
- When you add a **new record** to WorldCat
- **Replace** the WorldCat record to retain the controlled heading.



Controllable LC headings

- 1xx and 7xx (Name headings)
- 6xx 0 (Subject headings)
- 655 7 ‡2 lcgft (Genre headings)
- 8xx (Series added entries)

Search and browse LC authority files

Search - keyword – words in any order

Browse – exact phrase from left to right

- Initially puts you into a browse index
- Personal name <last name>, <first name>

Expanded browse – to include subfield

Indexes are mostly the same, but LCCN and OCLC ARN can only be used when searching.
